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Exploratory Day with the Year 4 Classes

The three Year 4 classes transformed an exploratory day (22 February 2017) into

a day of fun in the sun; experiencing learning in the tranquil surroundings of the picturesque Botanic Kings Park Gardens which overlooks the Swan River. The day was filled with laughter and joy as students moved between three stations of learning namely Visual Art, writing an informational report and exploring biological sciences - offered as activities by their teachers on a rotational teaching itinerary basis.



After enjoying a relaxing recess, students moved to the Gija Jumulu Boab Tree with



bottle-shaped swollen trunk. They found this to be an amazing sight, learning how the matured giant Boab, a 750 year-old tree, travelled 3,200km from the Kimberley region and replanted in 2008 in Kings Park, WA. The giant Boab is endemic to Australian soil. Also, the Boab Tree had been integral to the lives of the indigenous people as a source of water which

emanates from the hollows of its trunk. Furthermore, the white powder seed pods and the Boab's medicinal leaves are used as an important food source.



While one class wrote an informational report about the Gija Jumulu Boab describing it with some interesting facts, others illustrated the artistic elements of the Boab and Kings Park's landscape. The artworks were created by many students using oil pastels on art paper. Lastly, they engaged in a fun biological science activity after

which they had lunch. The day ended joyfully in the play park area as a reward for all their hard work and excellent behaviour. I would like to thank Mrs Md-Saini, Ms Rahmawati and Ms Sharma for contributing to the success of the day.
